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Judge turns Treaty Society membership issue back to Gitxsan to resolve

Smithers BC – On March 27, 2012, the BC Supreme Court issued a decision in response to the Gitxsan Treaty Society ("GTS") petition for an order under the *Society Act*.

The GTS sought the Court's assistance to correct a technical defect in the GTS's bylaws, relating to the method of appointing GTS directors. GTS asked the court to recognize all interested Gitxsan Simgiigyet (Hereditary Chiefs) as GTS members so they may appoint the GTS board of directors in a way that conforms to Gitxsan Ayookim (traditional law) and the provincial *Society Act*.

Justice McEwen decided to adjourn the petition, retaining jurisdiction to make further orders if necessary. In so doing, he stated it was "important that GTS continue." He added further that "Continuance of the GTS is also the best means to protect the interests of the Treaty Commission and the Government respondents as well."

In the end, he granted neither the order sought by the GTS nor the result favoured by the Spookw plaintiffs. Instead, he adjourned the petition on the basis that he expected a better model for open participation and membership to be developed. In essence, he turned the matter back to the Gitxsan to resolve.

In response, Gitxsan Negotiator Beverly Clifton Percival said: "We agree with the court's sentiment that it is important for the Gitxsan people to work together, and the GTS is committed to using the Gitxsan's long-standing laws and hereditary system of governance to do so. We think a Gitxsan-made solution will better serve the Gitxsan people, so welcome this opportunity, granted by the court."

The GTS recognizes that all Gitxsan people have an interest in treaty negotiations, particularly the younger generations. The GTS also respects the will of the Gitxsan Simgiligyet, expressed at a January 17, 2012 Gimlitxwit, at which a strong majority of the Simgiligyet affirmed their support for the GTS, and voted in favour of becoming GTS members with the right to control the society.

The GTS emphasised that the Simgiigyet are leaders of the Gitxsan Nation, responsible for and to the Gitxsan people. It is the Simgiigyet who represent the Gitxsan in treaty negotiations. The Treaty Society was formed in response to the Crown's requirement that the Gitxsan Simgiigyet incorporate a society before the Simgiigyet could be eligible for treaty funding. This treaty funding allows the Simgiigyet to participate in negotiations with the goal of reconciling the Gitxsan's pre-existing aboriginal rights, including title, with that of the Crown.

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
